Guidelines for Preparing for Women's and Gender Studies PhD Entrance Examination 2023-2024

Applicants would be assessed on how they establish their critical and analytical abilities translate into research potential. We hope to converse with a number of disciplines and thus, familiarity with your primary discipline (if not Women's Studies or Gender Studies) is an advantage. Yet, familiarity and interest in issues of gender and society in general will be essential. This will be assessed through examining the candidate's familiarity with key concepts, theories and current debates within the Women's and Gender Studies. What is expected is an interdisciplinary orientation.

Candidates are expected to be familiar with key concepts such as gender, patriarchy, sexuality, labour and so on. Awareness of key questions and theories emerging from women's movements will also be required. Methodologically feminist interventions and methods have borrowed and transformed mainstream social science research methodologies. An understanding of these will be required. Knowledge of current debates and events pertaining to gender will also be relevant.
