

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

## Campus

AUD is currently located at Kashmere Gate, within a 10-minute walk from the metro station. AUD hopes to move into its permanent campuses at Dheerpur and Rohini in the next five years.

## Student Life

Students at AUD start their day with classes but it gradually transforms into a day where students become part of a wide range of events happening across the University. At one moment one might see a street play in progress and at another moment one might walk into a discussion over serious issues. AUD students spend their day engaging in these activities, enjoying each moment with full zeal and then preparing for the events of the next day with equal enthusiasm.

Film screenings, literary festivals, musical nights, street plays, poetry recitations and other such events bring a diverse kind of culture to the students they not only enjoy but also learn from. A student not only gathers knowledge in lectures here at AUD, but the horizon of education goes beyond the four walls of classrooms.

#### The Student Cell

Understanding the need for a student support structure, AUD has created a Student Cell – a peer support group that would hand-hold and assist fellow students, especially those who are facing economic, academic, social or emotional difficulties, and identify and engage with such difficult experiences of the students. Its initiative rests vitally on the student's sense of responsibility towards themselves and on their sense of identification with the University. Such an effort may help in the creation of an institutional culture that would be marked by a sense of community and ownership, aimed at addressing the alienation that is often felt in such large spaces. The Student Cell would primarily act as a buffer between the students and the administration. It would be a





quasi-official body comprising largely of students themselves meant to act as a liaison between Student Services and the students. The Student Cell would become the first space for the students to approach in case of need.

#### **Cultural Activities**

AUD established a series of cultural societies to galvanise the intellectual and extracurricular life of students in the campus. There is a thriving Theatre Society, Sports Committee, Debating Society and Literary Society. The Economics Society, the Mathematics Society and the Society for Visual Culture have been activated. There are regular talks, lectures, screenings and performances in the campus and students are encouraged to participate in and organise events around them.

#### **AUD@city**

To celebrate the cultural and creative life of the student community and as an expression of AUD's connect with the wider community of the city of Delhi a two-day annual festival is organised at AUD. Aud@city is planned as a showcase event of AUD with the stated objective of highlighting the unique mandate of the University of combining 'access with success'. It is an event that showcases the different-ness of AUD what sets it apart from other institutions of higher learning in Delhi, by focusing on the advantages of being Delhi's State University -'of and for Delhi'. It also provides a space for creativity, inter-disciplinarity, multiculturalism and plurality.

#### Notes:

- 1. To be eligible to apply for admission to BA Honours in Economics and Mathematics, students must have obtained a minimum of 60% in Mathematics in the class XII examination from a recognised Board.
- 2. For applying to BA Honours in both Mathematics and Economics, the marks obtained in Mathematics in the XII Board Examination must be included in the calculation of the aggregate of the Best Four subjects of the XII Board Examination.
- 3. To be eligible to apply for admission to BA Honours English, students should have obtained a minimum of 65% in English in the XII Board Examination.

#### Research at AUD

Admissions to the MPhil programmes occur once a year in July-August. Admissions to the PhD programmes generally happen twice a year, in July-August and January-February. The number of seats available in each School for research may vary. Cutting-edge, unconventional and interdisciplinary research in new and established fields is welcome and encouraged at AUD.

#### Outreach

The School of Development Studies and the School of Human Studies have jointly launched an MPhil programme in Development Practice in collaboration with PRADAN. The Programme involves 'field immersion' for about two semesters in rural and tribal locations.

#### **Medium of Instruction**

The medium of instruction at AUD is English. However, we encourage students from different linguistic backgrounds to apply for admission to the different programmes at AUD. Specially designed courses in English are organised to help students improve their language proficiency.

#### Student Assessment and Evaluation

The purpose of assessment and evaluation at AUD is to facilitate and promote learning with understanding. Students are expected to be regular in attending classes, workshops and other educational exercises. Work done by students during the teaching semester will count for more than the end-of-course examination. Grades will be given to students for performance in tests, classroom presentations, group discussions, fieldwork/ project work, term papers and other exercises designed by teachers. The ability to work in a group or design an investigative project may be tested and evaluation may include peer assessment. Results of assessment will be communicated to students in a timely manner so that they have adequate opportunity to improve their subsequent work. Tutorials and mentoring will be important features of all programmes.

## Admissions 2014

#### **Eligibility**

To be eligible for MA programmes at AUD, candidates must have a Bachelor's degree with a minimum of 45 or 50 % marks (or equivalent grade) as the case may be, in different programmes from a recognised University in any discipline (there is relaxation of 5% for candidates belonging to Scheduled Caste, Scheduled Tribes and Physically Disabled).

Admission to the undergraduate programmes will be based on marks obtained in Class XII examinations.

#### Number of Seats

The total intake this year in most MA programme is 42 (including general as well as reserved seats as per norms set by the Government of NCT of Delhi). The total number of seats in other MA programmes:

The total intake this year in every BA programme is 35. There will be a total of 245 seats for all the Bachelor's programmes for the academic session 2014-15.

#### **Reservation of Seats**

Admissions will be made in accordance with the reservation policies of the Government of NCT of Delhi in respect of various social groups and other categories as applicable to institutions of higher education. Applicants claiming the benefit of reservations will have to produce the requisite certificates from the competent authorities. The current scheme of reservations is given below:

The quantum of reservation under the social categories specified above is subject to change according to the Regulations of the Government of the NCT of Delhi.

The NCT category will include those students who have passed their qualifying examination from an institution located in the NCT of Delhi or are residents in the NCT of Delhi.

Each applicant is required to apply in one of the following Categories:

Gen: General

SC: Scheduled CasteST: Scheduled Tribe

OBC: Other Backward Class, non-creamy layer

PD: Physically Disabled

**CW1:** Children/ Widows of Defence or Paramilitary Personnel, killed/disabled in action

CW2: Children/ Widows of Defence or Paramilitary Personnel, killed/disabled while on Duty

CW3: Children/ Widows of Defence or Paramilitary Personnel whose death in peace time can be attributed to military service

**CW4:** Children/ Widows of Defence or Paramilitary Personnel disabled in peace time which is attributable to military service

CW5: Wards of ex-service and serving personnel including Police who are in receipt of Gallantry Awards

FS: Foreign Nationals not studying in India

In the CW category, CW1 candidates will have pre-emptive claim over CW2 candidates; CW2 over CW3; CW3 over CW4; and CW4 over CW5. Only an Entitlement Certificate issued by the Secretary, Kendriya Sainik Board Delhi; Secretary, Rajya/ Zila Sainik Board; Officer-in-Charge, Record Office/ First Class Stipendiary Magistrate is acceptable.

OBC candidates need to submit both caste and non-creamy layer certificates to claim reservation against OBC quota. Creamy layer OBC candidates should apply as General category candidates.

Those applying under the **PD** category may note that only those candidates who submit proper medical certificates will be considered for admission under this category.

## Application Procedure

### Applying for Admission to AUD for UG and PG Programmes

The application process is computerised. There are no paper application forms.

There is one application form which is common for all undergraduate programmes and another application form which is common for all postgraduate programmes.

Application forms can be filled **on-campus** at the AUD campus in Kashmere Gate or **off-campus** (**online**) by logging on to www.aud.ac.in and following the instructions provided there.

#### **Important**

Before filling the online application form keep ready with you scanned copies of your photo and your signature in JPG/JPEG format (size less than 50 KB and not exceeding 200x200 pixels).

The application fee of Rs.400 per postgraduate programme (Rs.200 per programme for SC/ST/PD candidates) and Rs.300 per undergraduate programme (Rs150 per programme for SC/ST/PD candidates) can be paid by Demand Draft (DD)/ Cash/ Online.

If you opt for payment by DD, please have with you a DD for the correct amount

#### **Payment Options**

#### **Demand Draft**

You should have with you a DD in favour of 'Ambedkar University Delhi' payable at New Delhi. The amount will depend upon the number of courses you are going to apply for (see above). Enter the DD details in the online application form when required.

After successful submission of the online application form, download a PDF copy.

A printed copy of the application form, along with the DD, has to be deposited at the Kashmere Gate Campus of AUD or sent by post to:

Candidates using this option must ensure that the DD along with a printed copy of the filled application form reaches the University before 4:00 pm on the last date for submission of applications.

#### Cash

Visit the AUD campus in Kashmere Gate. Get a receipt after making payment in cash of the requisite amount, depending on the number of courses you wish to apply for. Enter cash receipt details in the online application form when required.

You can fill the application form either at the AUD Computer Lab or online from anywhere.

#### Online (Credit/ Debit card/ Net banking)

Choose the online option when required Click on the save button You will be directed to the Billdesk Payment Gateway.

Enter the details of your credit/debit card or net banking particulars.

#### Make the payment.

Once payment is made successfully, you will be redirected to the online application form.

If the payment is not successful you will be directed again to the Billdesk Payment Gateway.



## Fee Structure

The vision guiding AUD is the commitment that prospective students learn to value and appreciate the social privileges they enjoy because of the heavy subsidy that goes into public institutions of higher education in India. Therefore, a minimum proportion of the cost actually to be incurred by the University for each of its students is reflected in the fee being set per semester. Based on this philosophy, AUD has instituted a differential fee structure for different programmes, with an understanding that the upper slab is envisaged not to be so high that only a particular segment of society can afford it and the lower slab not so low that the sense of responsibility among the students goes missing.

The differential fee structure ranges from Rs.1,000 to Rs.2,000 per credit of course work for most courses. Students will also be expected to bear additional expenses related to field visits, cost of supplementary programme, (learning) materials etc.

In addition students are required to pay Rs.500 per semester to the Student Welfare Fund, Rs.5,000 is to be paid as a refundable security deposit.

It may be noted that at present the fee constitutes not more than 10 per cent of the operational costs. It is also the stated policy of the University that no deserving applicant, as far as is possible, is denied the opportunity of studying at AUD merely due to her/his inability to pay the fees.

#### **Payment of Fees**

All candidates who will be provisionally offered admission to a programme are required to deposit the fee within the time stipulated in the admission notice.

Students will be required to pay the fees of the subsequent semester/s within 4 weeks of the commencement of classes. A penalty of Rs.100, will be imposed per week for late payment and after 4 weeks of non-payment, the name of the student shall be de-enrolled from the programme.

#### Fee Waiver and Scholarships

The University offers full and partial fee waivers to students who are in need of support given their economic background. In fact, 25 per cent of the fees collected from students are returned to the economically disadvantaged students by way of fee waivers and scholarships. In the previous years, many students have been awarded fee waivers. Most of these have been full fee waivers.

The University has also created a student welfare fund in order to support students in need in bearing the costs of study material (like photocopying), textbooks, and even subsistence.

### Procedure for Applying for Fee Waiver and Scholarships

At the time of admission, a student can apply for fee waiver by submitting supporting documents.

If provisionally admitted to a programme, s/he will be permitted to take admission without having to pay the fee.

Students, whose combined annual family income is less than Rs.4,00,000, will be eligible for fee waiver. A student will continue to receive fee waiver provided he/she is found to be regular in attending classes and maintains an acceptable level of performance in studies.

SC/ST/PD students are advised to submit their application in the month of February for Scholarships under the SC/ST/PD categories for the academic session of that year.

#### Student Welfare Fund

The University has created a Student Welfare Fund with the objective of making financial assistance available for meeting the welfare needs of students in need, such as emergent medical assistance, purchase of books and study material, meeting the boarding and lodging expenses equivalent to the amount that is required to avail of AUD hostel facilities, and any other comparable needs of students.

An amount of Rs.500 per semester is collected from all students towards the Student Welfare Fund and an equal amount is contributed by the University. The Fund is managed and monitored by a Committee which includes a nominee of the student community.

Through the fee structure as well as the exemptions offered, AUD hopes to inculcate a social sensitivity in its students – to respect what they enjoy as privileges and to be able to serve society in their future professional capacities.

#### **REFUND OF FEES - University Policy**

Before Orientation for a programme Rs.1,000 would be deducted.

After Orientation for a programme only caution deposit would be refunded.

The decision of the Admission Committee on all matters of admission will be final.

The jurisdiction of any dispute will be limited to the NCT of Delhi.

#### **Admission of Foreign Students**

A few seats are reserved for foreign students in every programme.

#### Eligibility

Foreign nationals who are not in India need to apply through their Consulate or Embassy.

All foreign nationals must hold a student visa valid for the entire period of study endorsed by the Ministry of External Affairs. Government of India.

The degrees of foreign nationals must be recognised by the Association of Indian Universities.

Fees for foreign students will be twice the fee applicable to Indian students for each semester and Rs.500 per semester towards the Student Welfare Fund. In addition they will be required to pay Rs.10,000 as a refundable deposit.

### Introduction

SCCE is visualised as a location that implements a new vision of art pedagogy and practice in the country. The School provides a nurturing ground for the development of new and different art practices and theoretical insights across the areas of Visual Art, Literary Art, Performance Art and Cinematic Art. The School offers MA programmes in: (1) Visual Art (2) Literary Art: Creative Writing (3) Performance Studies and (4) Film Studies. These programmes focus on research orientation and experimental practices while imparting historical and theoretical knowledge that entail critical reading, and practice. These programmes also impart knowledge and skills in the respective areas of creativity.

### **MA in Visual Art**

The Visual Art programme takes into view a crisis in the discipline of Fine Arts and therefore stresses the need for initiating a new model of pedagogy. The programme undertakes to integrate various inputs of interdisciplinary nature combined with \ skills, methodological framework, \conceptual thinking, theoretical and historical knowledge, socio-politico awareness and ethical integrity.

### MA in Literary Art (Creative Writing)

The programme has pioneered the pedagogy of creative writing in India with its unique insistence on inculcating in the student both the practice and the theory of literary writing. Rather than simply equip students already fluent in English with a set of supplementary skills, it teaches them to acquaint themselves with the literary idioms of the many languages of the sub-continent and of Europe. The programme is keen on fostering generic innovation as students write in a way that traverses genres, media (dance, film, theatre, the visual arts) and historical and geographic boundaries.

### **MA in Performance Studies**

MA in Performance Studies focuses on the pervasiveness of performance as a central element of social and cultural life, including not only theatre and dance but also such forms as rituals and practices of everyday life, avant-garde performance art, popular entertainment, sports, political demonstrations and potentially any instance of expressive behaviour or cultural enactment. The programme aims to contribute to the development of engaged scholarship in the field with a unique perspective given the rich and varied experience situated in and informed by the culture and heritage of India.

### **MA in Film Studies**

The programme tries to address the task of studying cinema in India in all its varieties in a global comparativist mode without subscribing to any pre-set hierarchy of aesthetic merit and artistic excellence. It seeks to bridge the gap between a philosophical understanding of film as an art form and the cultural studies understanding of its role as mass media drawing on the rich theoretical legacies of Benjamin, Kracauer and Deleuze among others. Particular attention is paid to the multi-sited film production in India not allowing the undue attention paid to Bollywood to eclipse the pluralisation of film cultures in India. The programme is equally interested in fostering historical. anthropological and textual analysis of cinema paving close attention to its embedded nature in the social and political history of the country.

### **PhD Programes**

The School offers PhD programmes in Visual Art, Literary Art and Film Studies. The unique feature of these programmes is that they have developed a curriculum structure for practice-based artistic research.

All MPhil and PhD candidates selected for the entrance test must submit research proposals in English on the date of the entrance test. Applicants who do not submit a proposal at that time will be deemed ineligible for admission. The research proposal should be a coherent statement (recommended 700 - 1000 words) indicating the nature of the proposed topic (with tentative title), specific issues to be explored or questions to be answered by the proposed research, the kinds of sources or materials/artifacts to be used in answering the research questions, and the locations of the sources and means of accessing them. The research proposal must be accompanied by a select bibliography/sources list (maximum two pages). Note that a research proposal which is only a narrative of 'what is known' or what scholars have written about the topic and which does not suggest paths for further research will be taken less seriously. If the applicant is invited to an entrance interview following the entrance test, he/she will be expected to discuss the research proposal in the interview. The research proposal must

include a cover page with the following statement: 'The undersigned declares that this research proposal has not been prepared by another person and is the product of his/her individual work' [-- followed by signature of the applicant].

- **Brief programme description**: The course work component of this M. Phil. programme consists of four courses of four credits each (total =16 credits). The courses offered are as follows:
- 1. Course I: Hindi Sahitya ke Itihas ki Samasyaen
- 2. Course II: Sahitya ka Samajshastra
- 3. Course III: Research Paper I- Essay focusing on the theme of proposed research topic of the student. The topic shall be allotted to the student by the Research Studies Committee (RSC) of the School of Liberal Studies.
- 4. Course IV: Research Paper II- Essay on the theme given to the student by the Research Studies Committee (RSC) keeping in view his/her proposed research topic.

### MPHIL DEVELOPMENT PRACTICE

The MPhil Programme in Development Practice is offered jointly by the School of Human Studies (SHS) and the School of Development Studies (SDS) in collaboration with PRADAN.

PRADAN is a public service organisation promoting and strengthening livelihoods of the rural poor. PRADAN works directly with the poor, through small teams of professionals, in the villages of Jharkhand, Odisha, Madhya Pradesh, Chhattisgarh, West Bengal, Rajasthan and Bihar.

One of the highlights of the Programme is the opportunity to connect with the other partners — Sir Dorabji Tata Trust (SDTT) and Rohini Ghadiok Foundation (RGF).

### PROGRAMME DESCRIPTION

Development – as a concept has multiple connotations and the complexity of its many contours and trajectories have become an area of intense contestation in the social sciences and in what has now come to be known as the 'development sector'. However, the practice of development has largely failed to address the lived experiences and the livelihood-health-governance-educational issues of a large segment of the rural population.

The MPhil in Development Practice, through an examination of the unexamined 'underdevelopment of the rural' and the equally unexamined 'royal road to Development', plans to help the student set-up a long-term and engaged relationship with the rural through an immersion-based training in rural contexts. In the process, it wishes to give birth to a Development Sector

Professional who would have the capacity to initiate social transformation in rural India. The student will thus have both the theoretical and the practical experience to imagine, initiate and give shape to transformative social action in community contexts. In keeping with AUD's vision of social equity and engaged scholarship, the programme aims to link the transformation of the self to the larger goals of developmental justice and collective transformation.

The programme also re-visits the given idea of research through **Action Research Projects**. Action Research takes 'transformation' as the object/ area of enquiry and creates a body of knowledge based on existing research on transformation, or knowledge of transformation, and the actual practice of grassroots level transformative social action.

Courses offered in the Programme are geared to the fulfilment of these objectives.

## SCHOOL OF HUMAN STUDIES (SHS)

SHS is an explorative, interdisciplinary space for thinking and reflecting on the myriad meanings of being human. Academic programmes housed in the School focus on the promise and potential of the human along with the actual historical exclusions and marginalisations that humans have led to.

### MPHIL IN WOMEN'S AND GENDER STUDIES

The AUD – Centre for Women's Development Studies (CWDS) collaboration provides the MPhil Programme with a diversified area of research. As a premier research centre, CWDS will provide students an unparalleled resource of active research projects to affiliate with, and a vibrant community of researchers who can supervise their dissertation/ thesis. This unique collaboration supplements the development approach to gender with the interdisciplinary resources at AUD, in particular literature, film, psychology, sociology, history and expressive cultures.

### TEACHING METHODOLOGY

The pedagogies of teaching and learning employed at Women's and Gender Studies are intended to inculcate a feminist sensibility in our students in ways that balance academic rigour with intellectual freedom.

Students are encouraged to experience the personal as political by bringing into the classroom spaces critical reflection on their own and others' life histories and activism in conjunction with feminist texts and theorisation.

### SYSTEM OF CREDITS

**MPHIL:** This is a 30 credit course, with one year of course work of 18 credits.

**DIRECT PHD:** Selected MPhil students, subject to performance, may proceed to doctoral research after completing 18 credits of courses of the MPhil Programme (without completing an MPhil thesis). Direct admission of doctoral scholars is also possible under the combined MPhil/PhD Programme.

Direct PhD in Women's and Gender Studies entails mandatory course work as allocated to the student. It will include specific courses designed to strengthen the core areas of research of each student and courses on methodology, theory or movements as required. The total number of credits of course work will depend on how many courses are allocated to each student and will vary accordingly.

### DISSERTATION

The MPhil dissertation in the second year of the Programme allows students to do independent research under supervision.

This is an opportunity to not only contribute to knowledge production in the field of Women's and Gender Studies but also to interpret and challenge existing knowledge systems with a gender-sensitive lens.

The research thus conducted is also expected to help students in identifying the potential areas of research and work to be taken up after the completion of their Programme. #### SUPERVISORY ARRANGEMENT

A Supervisor from SHE shall be assigned after the offer of an admission has been made. A PhD Advisory Committee (PAC) shall be constituted for each scholar, which would meet regularly to recommend coursework and monitor the research scholar's progress during the programme.

Candidates are encouraged to discuss their proposed research with possible supervisors at AUD before beginning the application process. Co-supervisory arrangements are possible with experts and scholars outside the School or even outside AUD on condition that they have recognised academic credentials, and the Research

Studies Committee (RSC) of the School should be convinced that the involvement of this person would significantly enhance the quality of the doctoral scholar's research.

#### **COURSE WORK**

Candidates admitted without MPhil are required to complete a minimum of 16 credits of course work within a period of one or two semesters as prescribed by the RSC of the School.

The order in which these courses are completed and the number of credits to be undertaken in one or two semesters is determined by the RSC on the basis of the recommendation of the candidate's PhD Advisory Committee (PAC). The RSC has the right to prescribe course work even to admitted doctoral scholars already holding MPhil degrees.

Participation in course work presumes a scholar's residence in the Delhi region during the officially recognised academic year/ sessions and the scholar's regular attendance of classes and related exercises. Exceptions to the 'residency requirement' could be made for scholars who are prescribed course work or 'pre-thesis' learning activities of a kind which cannot be fulfilled at AUD or which the research studies committee specifically prescribes to be done in some other place/under special conditions.

Other courses and pre-submission activities could be prescribed to a doctoral scholar by the RSC, according to the scholar's particular research requirements.

#### **FEES:**

Rs.1,250 per credit for Course Work + Rs.5,000 per semester during Research/ Dissertation + Rs.500 per semester for Student Welfare Fund + Rs.5,000 as refundable Security Deposit.

Partial support available for eligible candidates from the Student Welfare Fund; TA-ships may be offered to eligible candidates.

#### STIPEND:

### MONITORING PROGRESS OF PhD CANDIDATES

The duration of the doctoral scholar's enrolment is subject to the general research studies regulations of AUD. Scholars enrolling with MPhil may submit a dissertation for examination no sooner than 18 months following enrolment, while those enrolling without MPhil may submit it no sooner than 24 months after enrolment.

Four milestones in the PhD process will be monitored by the supervisor and the RSC:

- Successful completion of coursework: normally within 12 months of enrolment.
- Presentation and defence of research synopsis: between 12 and 18 months after enrolment.
- Mid-term research seminar: public seminar to be arranged by the SHE RSC.
- PhD defence in presence of AUD supervisor, co-supervisor (if any), thesis examiners, and any other invited expert.

### FEATURES OF THE PROGRAMME

The PhD Programmes in Visual Art, Literary Art and Film Studies fork into two kinds of research possibilities. One is a regular PhD, a conspectus of critical enquiry and research related to the artistic stream or an innovative practice-based PhD that would reflect SCCE's pioneering notion of practice-based learning.

The practice-based dissertation is effectively a memoire, a sustained reflection on the origin and emergence of an artistic product (visual art repertoire, literary texts in different genres, for instance). It will have three components — a creative manifestation (a creative endeavour in whatever stage of completion that demonstrates sustained mediation on the research question), a reflexive written document (which is akin to a conventional thesis setting up the driving question, reflections on the creative processes and results achieved) and an archive (a memoire of the processes that lead to the creative work).

## SCHOOL OF CULTURE AND CREATIVE EXPRESSIONS (SCCE)

SCCE is visualised as a location that implements a new vision of art pedagogy and practice in the country.

The School will provide a nurturing ground for the development of new and different art-making practices and theoretical insights across the areas of Visual Art, Literary Art, Performance Art and Cinematic Art.

### PHD AT SCCE

The imperative of practice aligns SCCE postgraduate work to AUD's own cherished need to connect to concrete forms of life and livelihood. What is human about practice, which is also its humanitas, or in a Greek sense its paideia, is that it ennobles the pattern of a life in ways that have much in common with struggles around sexuality and gender.

This may seem counter-intuitive but the increased need to rally our desires and energies around forms of self-conduct that we choose for ourselves and that we cultivate for ourselves is evident in many spheres of Indian social life today.

Hence, too, the importance of the SCCE practice-based degree to the very future of the humanities, in as much as what is at stake is the possibility of an 'aesthetics of existence' that brings together theoretical-conceptual labour on the one hand, and artistic or technico-practical endeavour, on the other.

### **COURSE WORK**

The SCCE's MA is to be the benchmark for assessing the critical ability of the student. Hence, SCCE-MA students who proceed to register for PhD will have to complete 16 credits of PhD coursework over one year; whereas others will have to complete 32 credits in the same period.

Continuing Students of SCCE will enrol for two mandatory PhD level taught courses and two guided (independent) study courses.

The guided independent study, to be designed in consultation with a faculty member, has to be approved by the SCCE-Research Standing Committee (RSC) keeping in mind the intellectual inclinations of the candidate. Likewise the complementary MA courses for non-AUD students will be offered on the advice of SCCE-RSC in tune with the scholarly, interdisciplinary and philosophical training required by the proposed research.

### DURATION OF THE PROGRAMME

The minimum duration of the PhD programme is 3 years, which is extendable by another year on compelling reasons pertaining to the particular project.

The first two semesters, that is, the first year will consist of course work. The third semester will be devoted to the gestation of a fully-fledged research proposal accompanied by bibliographical/ referential evidence.

At a date, no later than the end of the third semester, the candidature of the student to a PhD degree would have been confirmed. The next three semesters and any period of extension will be spent in research, practice-based or otherwise.
